


Release Date: January 6




The Unfortunate Importance of Beauty by Amanda Filipacchi

Release Date: February 16




Release Date: March 3






The Illuminations by Andrew O'Hagan

Release Date: March 24





This new YA novel is coming out just in time for summer reading! Told in alternating "before" and "after" chapters, Gina Ciocca's novel follows Kelsey and David—two best friends who were inseperable the summer before freshman year of high school. A misunderstanding turned Kelsey into the school joke and ended her friendship—making her eager to start over when her parents decided to move away. Jumping to senior year, she has a new group of friends and a boyfriend, which gets a lot more complicated when David moves to town.



Lady Midnight (Book #1—The Dark Artifices) by Cassandra Clare

Release Date: TBA 2015

The upcoming Cassandra Clare book enters a new series titled *The Dark Artifices*. It takes place five years since the events in *The Mortal Instruments* and Emma has dedicated her life to finding out what killed her parents and getting her revenge.
